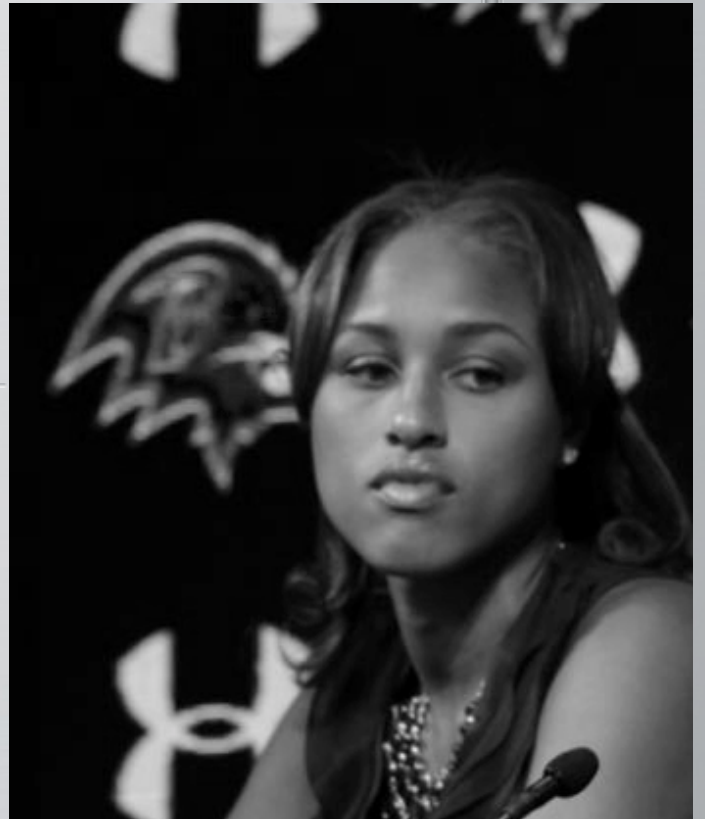


The Heart of an Abuser



Mark 7:21-23

“For from within, out of the heart of man, come evil thoughts, sexual immorality, theft, murder, adultery, coveting, wickedness, deceit, sensuality, envy, slander, pride, foolishness. All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.”

Our behavior flows from
the desires of our hearts.

Contributing Factors, Symptoms, and Cause

Contributing Factor:

something that contributes to the situation, but is not the cause.

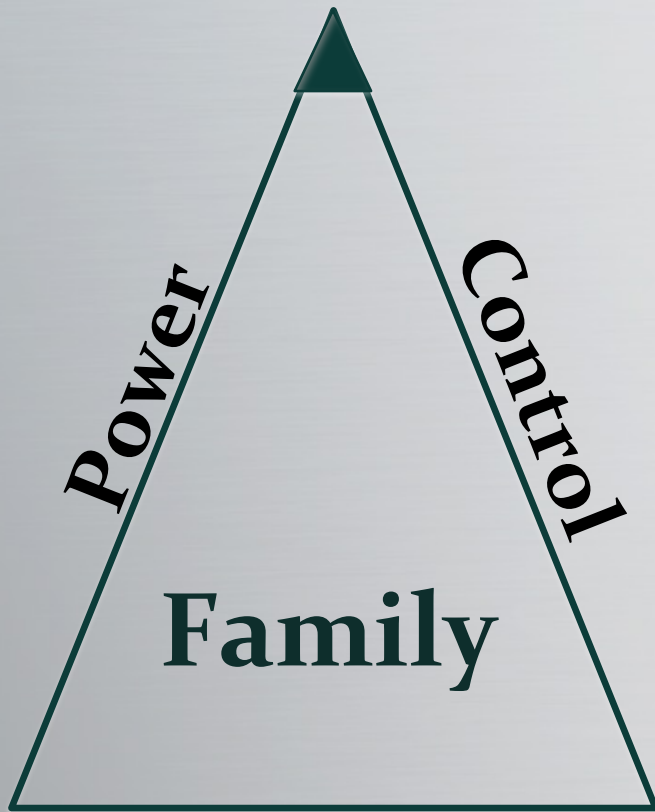
- Drugs and alcohol
- Growing up in an abusive family

Contributing Factors, Symptoms, and Cause

Symptom: a behavior that indicates abuse is present.

- Anger

Power and Control



- Abusive actions are *tools* used to control
- Oppression = Power Imbalance
- Anger: control through intimidation & fear

He's not abusive because he's angry.
He's angry because he's abusive.



Solution: Control himself more

He's not abusive because he's angry.
He's angry because he's abusive.

Solution: Control her less

Entitlement

The abuser's belief that he has a special status and that it provides him with exclusive rights and privileges that do not apply to his partner.

Entitlement

- The center of his partner's universe
- The abuser's desires and preferences become edicts that his wife must obey.

A Desire to be God

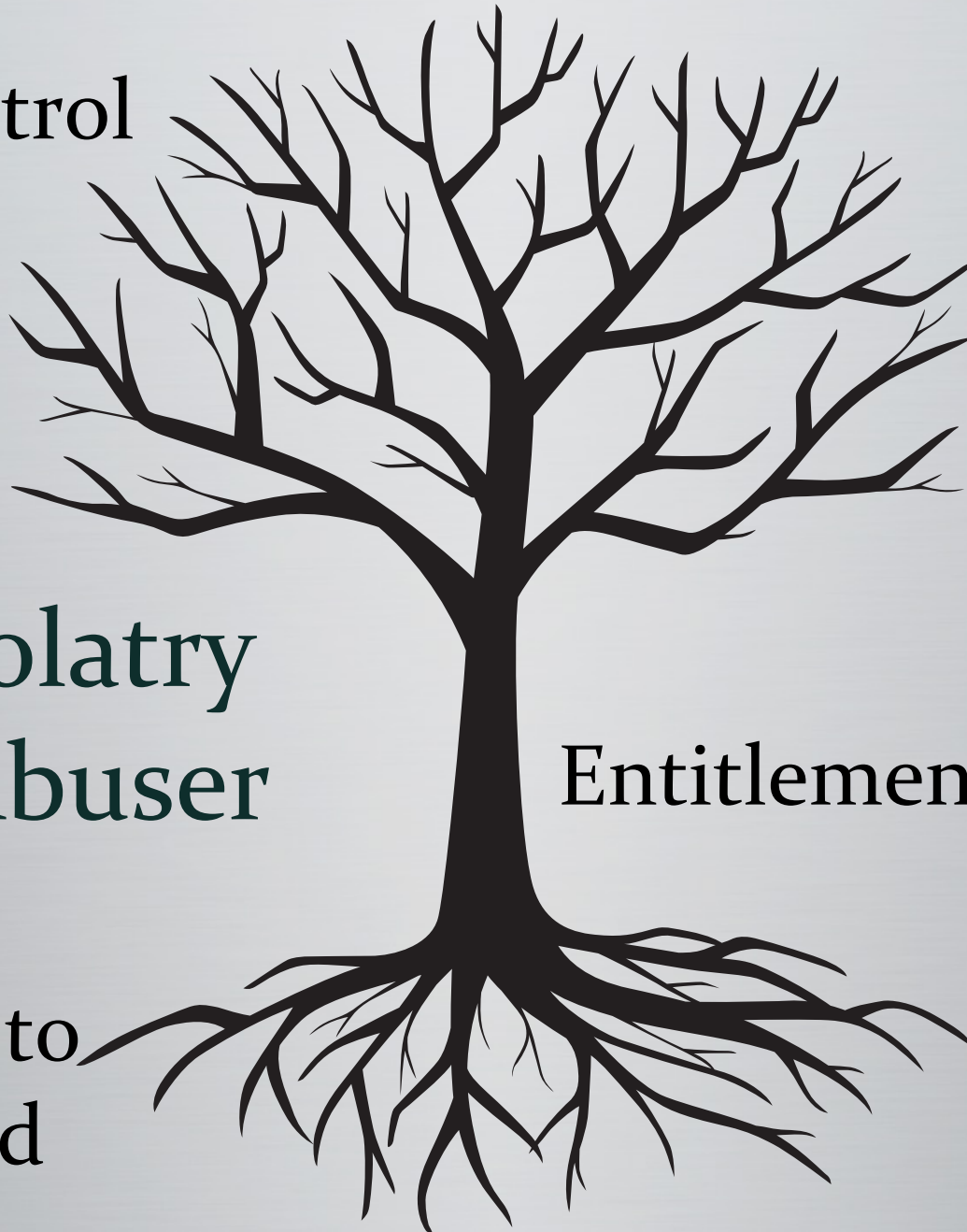
- Sovereign control.
